4. *Inspection Checklist*: Detail the critical inspection points, indicating whether they meet standards or require repairs.
5. *Signoff*: Provide a section for final approval, confirming whether the equipment is safe to operate or needs corrective action.
6. *Corrective Actions*: Document any maintenance performed or additional actions required to ensure the equipment meets inspection criteria.
