Fire Prevention

- *Accountability:* Conduct roll calls at assembly points and account for all personnel
- *Assistance Plans:* Identify and support individuals requiring evacuation assistance
- *Containment Measures:* Encourage closing doors behind evacuating personnel to slow smoke spread
